## Valyland to be extended

The Valyland shopping centre is to be altered and extended. The developers plan to move the nursery to a new site (the grassy area between the car wash and the circle at Fish Hoek Middle School) and to extend the shopping centre outwards across where the nursery was and towards Nerina (and the consulting rooms). The plan is for shops on the ground floor and offices above. Most of the new building will be on the site previously planned for a medical centre. Objections have been called for and the developer's architects and planners presented the plans to the executive of your Association. Their traffic engineer's view is that the increase in traffic volume will not have a major adverse effect. More parking bays are planned, allowing more bays per built area than now.

#### **Uncertain future for Bayside Bazaar**

There are still no fixed plans for Bayside Bazaar. The City's Department of Economic Development didn't like the original proposal for "beach huts" and put forward two alternatives, one which uses corrugated iron and the other containers. Neither of these is suitable. Corrugated iron will rust too rapidly and containers would not be an aesthetically pleasing solution. Our ward councillors will be putting forward alternative ideas.

#### **Christmas lights celebration**

This year there will be an official Christmas lights switch-on. Plans so far, for Friday 30 November between 6pm and 8pm, include the Navy band playing at the traffic circle end of Main Road, Fish Hoek.

#### Ward forums ready to go

After having non-functional, controversial ward committees for the greater Fish Hoek area under the previous city administration, the present administration has established new ward forums. It would appear that these have a sufficiently broad representation of various interest groups (including your Association) and the Association wishes them every success for meaningful community input.

#### Holiday season law enforcement

The Fish Hoek law enforcement offices (whose area of concern stretches from Clovelly to Noordhoek to Simon's Town) will have six temporary staff members added to the two officers doing their best to cope with all the work required. From 20 November, the law enforcement offices on Fish Hoek beach will be open daily from 7am to 7pm.

#### Non-existent street names

Your Association is collecting information on streets which do not have street-name signs or whose signs are obscured. Please let the Association know of any such streets. The Association would also like to urge its members to ensure that their properties are clearly numbered and that the numbers are not obscured. This is essential when emergency services (police, ambulance, fire-fighters) are trying to find a property (...and it helps Father Christmas too!).

#### **Orderly Guy Fawkes**

Except for panicked pets, the Guy Fawkes celebrations on the Fish Hoek beach went off well, according to law enforcement agencies. The police, city law enforcement, Metro police, Mach1 Security and some neighbourhood watch volunteers were on duty from early on in the evening to see that no one strayed from the prescribed areas and that people younger than 16 did not light fireworks without adult supervision. The police said that except for a lot of firecrackers, there were no serious incidents. A flare, fired from outside the demarcated area did, however, waft across onto Elsies Peak, flaring up into a fire almost immediately. The valiant volunteers from Disaster Management responded within minutes, as did other emergency vehicles, and the fire fighters managed to douse the fire with relative ease.

#### New Signage legislation

Although new legislation relating to signs was to have come into effect on November 1, according to Debbie Evans, Chief Environmental Control Officer, Environmental Resource Management Department in the City of Cape Town, the bylaw is now only to come into effect in the new year. One of the issues that should be dealt with are the irritating newspaper posters with their lurid announcements flapping along almost every pole in Kommetjie Road and elsewhere. The draft bylaw, as it now stands, would make this illegal, as there has to be a person (not a shop) selling newspapers within 200m of the posters. The City has in its employ four contracting firms who are responsible for the removal of illegal signage erected on City land. Each sign removed is recorded and the offending party is billed according to specified tariffs and charges. Ms Evans encouraged the public to report illegal signage – when we know what that is – to Janine Pick on 021 400 3147 or e-mail janine.pick@capetown.gov.za or fax 021 425 4448 and the City would then instruct their contractors to remove them.

# Main Road upgrade

The lack of maintenance of Main Road and its underground infrastructure has as its direct result several years of disruption as upgrading of the road, etc. starts next year. The City had meetings with interest groups, but it appears their plans will go ahead no matter what the comments are. The problem of no suitable alternative route will remain just that – a problem. Ou Kaapse Weg will not be upgraded, nor will there be any provision of climbing lanes for slow-moving traffic, despite this having been recommended during the time of the South Peninsula Municipality by their own consultants, as the priority project for the area. In the "Comment and Responses" document, the City states that they "have considered" requesting

that Province enable the Chapman's Peak tolls to be lower during the period of construction, for local residents & business owners. Our view is that Chapman's Peak should be free during that period (should the road ever open). The City is having undisclosed discussions with Metrorail relating to the movement of commuters and will be "auditing" the traffic lights to see if tailbacks are because of inefficient signal timing. It would appear that the construction work will take at least four years. No cycle track will be constructed. Although the Clovelly end of the road will be the last phase to be completed, traffic in general will be affected by increased tailbacks, congestion and the resulting longer travel times. Brace yourself!

#### Land value rise causes densification & ugly buildings

With the increase in land values, the Association has noted a trend, especially in the early avenues that enjoy General Residential zoning (i.e. read flats), for new owners to demolish houses and build as big a building as possible, to add to the structure as much as possible, or subdivide below the minimum regulated. The result is a hodge-podge of small flats or crammed additions. Most owners in these cases are applying for departures from the zoning regulations. This is a trend in other areas in the Far South Peninsula. While the Association notes the need for development, we are only in favour of well designed, aesthetically pleasing structures that conform to the requirements set for height, building lines and coverage etc. Equally disturbing are the number of applications in process for the rezoning of the last pockets of rural/agricultural zoned land. These proposals are generally for the most profitable feasible projects that the developers can motivate. Owing to the City's stated policy of densification, the officials are prone to recommend many proposals that conflict with a confusing plethora of Zoning Schemes, Structures Plans, Interim Policies etc. - most of which, ironically have been commissioned by themselves. The Civics of the Far South Peninsula are continually 'fencing off the back foot' and we appeal for help from anyone with experience or skills in the planning, legal or environmental fields.

#### **Valuations**

The Far South Peninsula Community Forum representatives met with Councillor Ian Neilson, the City's Exco head of Finance, on the 2<sup>nd</sup> October. After a long, and sometimes heated debate Cllr Neilson agreed to the following:

- 1. Obtain confirmation that the closing date for objections would be extended.
- 2. Provide advice to objectors equivalent to that provided by the information offices during March.
- 3. Approach Council regarding the waiving/deferment of fees for late objections.
- 4. Provide the 29 parameters and the criteria used to adjust valuations.
- 5. Provide a copy of the full audit.
- 6. Investigate changing the criteria for awarding rates rebates, to allow more people to qualify.
- 7. Investigate having old-age homes and retirement villages pay rates on the residential rather than commercial scales.
- 8. Investigate having rented flats pay rates on the residential rather than commercial scales.
- 9. Investigate allowing heritage residential properties a rebate.
- 10. Investigate adding the age of the building as a parameter in the valuation model.
- 11. Send out more informative and user-friendly public communications on property owners' rights and options with regard to objections.
- 12. Investigate having a full re-valuation done for each sold property considered during the modelling as an "outlier" and initially discarded for purpose of the modelling, and then running the models again with these properties included.
- 13. Discuss with valuers the refining of the modelling exercise with a view to the next valuation being more correct.
- 14. Investigate the possibility of the City appointing a small group of ratepayers' representatives to a Review Group to be given access to the data used in the valuation modelling. The Group will be asked to review valuations in general and submit objections for properties considered for any reason to have been valued wrongly or to have been valued too high or too low.

#### eMzantsi Carnival

This is the third year of the new eMzantsi Carnival, the carnival for the people of the south, organised by a team led by Sam Pearce, who is married to our next guest speaker (see below). The carnival will take place on Saturday 1 December. The theme this year is "eMzantsipation" – emancipation. Not only is it linked to the date of the emancipation of the slaves in the Cape hundreds of years ago, it is now linked to the emancipation of each and every one of us from crime. Neighbourhood watches will be among those marching in the morning parade which ends at the open ground at Sun Valley Mall. This year the carnival has spread and has representation from Muizenberg right down to Kommetjie. Representatives from Fish Hoek and Clovelly are a bit thin on the ground and anyone who belongs to a church, club or an interest group is welcome to phone Sam to join in.
