Précis of Guest Speaker's Topic

Shorter term (next five years)

- •Impact of current roads upgrades
- Continued organic- and migration-related growth of Masi

Proposed Amendments to Municipal Planning By-Law (MPBL)

This will allow for third dwellings, personal telecommunication stations, "toll roads", small land units permitted to build to the boundary, water tanks must be less than 2.5 m in height and boundary walls to 2.5 m plus 1 m for spikes, barbed wire, razor wire or electric fences. We requested a defined registration and commenting process, removal of any politician from the appeal process, provision of owner's motivation for departures and preservation of our heritage resources.

Proposed changes to our Constitution

As the City no longer wishes to look after our historic sites (see MPBL above) and in order to register with Heritage Western Cape (HWC), HWC recommended that we change our Constitution to reflect our interest in preserving heritage resources. Therefore, it is proposed that under Section 2: Objects of the Association to delete: Section 2.3 To oppose all undesirable actions and developments.

And replace with:

- 2.3 To monitor and review all actions and developments with the intention of:
- 2.3.1 Preventing civic actions that are undesirable for our constituents;
- 2.3.2 Constraining developments that lead to urban sprawl and are contrary to best urban planning practice and the interests of our constituents; and
- 2.3.3 **Preserving the heritage resources** of our area in a manner consistent with the applicable National Heritage Act and the Western Cape Heritage Resource Management Regulations.

DRAFT TOURISM DEVELOPMENT FRAMEWORK FOR 2019-2023

The goal of the City is to increase the number of visitors, encourage the lengthening of their stay here and increase their daily spend. We think they should:

- 1 Increase law enforcement visibility;
- 2 Invest in good quality, international cuisine dining training;
- 3 Get law enforcement to patrol the interfaces between urban areas and the Table Mountain National Park;
- 4 Improve the state of the beaches; and
- 5 Build / provide and improve the state of our public toilets.

RECYCLING FISH HOEK CENTRAL BUSINESS DISTRICT (CBD)

Our environmentalist, and others, attended a meeting with the City on this topic. The City said that they have four employees who clean the CBD area seven days a week. They clean the streets of litter and empty the green street bins and the beach bins. In the peak season (to the end of April), the City employs additional helpers on the Extended Public Works Programme (EPWP). However, the PRASA land around the station is the responsibility of PRASA. A survey of the contents of the green bins and street litter is planned to investigate the feasibility of recycling the contents; then a pilot project may follow. Our Business Improvement District (BID) needs to support this 'street recycling project' and survey the potential for improved recycling of their commercial 'waste'.

GRAFFITI AND TAGGING

PICK 'N PAY LIQUOR (FISH HOEK)

has requested an extension to their trading hours from 18:00 to 20:00 Monday to Saturday and 11:00 to 18:00 on Sundays stating in their application that this is in the public interest, it will not prejudice religious facilities nor pose a risk or nuisance. We objected.

FISH HOEK / CLOVELLY BRIDGE

PRASA has agreed to blocking off the bridge subject to engineering plans and funding.

Weekly reports from the Rail Enforcement Unit (REU) of arrests and court cases are encouraging.

STORM-WATER SAMPLINGS

We have walked the storm-water network path from the beach "lighthouse" into the village with City officials on two separate occasions. We have identified some water sampling points above joins and possible hot spots as potential sources of mammalian bacteria, possibly indicating raw sewage. The City is trying to book time for using a camera to be pushed up the network to look for unauthorised connections. The rising main at the SAPS station is still broken, but Public Works is not acknowledging our requests to repair this and stop using a honey sucker. We have requested dedicated power to sewage pumps. During load shedding, the sewage pipes back-up and overflow into the stormwater system.

2019/20 CITY BUDGET

The Electricity Levy increased by 8.88%, which is 35% more than the City's cost of purchasing directly from Eskom. We're currently on Level 3 water tariff, but the City's proposal is to move this tariff table to the new Level 1. Therefore, the proposed new Level 3 water tariff represents an increase of 16% and not 8.88% as declared by the City. As the average increase in property valuations is 33% - 34%, your property rates will probably increase. The breakeven is a 30% increased valuation to offset the 22% lower "rate in rand" multiplier. So, depending upon your increased valuation, if it is higher than 30%, your property rates will increase accordingly. Refuse removal increased by 5% and sanitation by 9%. Funding to complete existing work on Ou Kaapse Weg is on the budget. Our main complaint is the ever-increasing, already bloated staff numbers with concomitant decrease in efficiency. Staffing costs increased by 8%; this is well above the inflation rate. Our view is that as the fixed water and electricity costs are not consumption based in terms of the Local Government: Municipal Systems Act #32 of 2000's Section 74 (2) A tariff policy must ... (b) ... be in proportional to the use of that service, they should be scrapped.

Load Shedding Tips

- Print the load-shedding schedule for your area or download a load-shedding schedule app to have advanced warning of when you'll be without power.
- Charge your electronics fully, especially your cell phone.
- Keep your car's fuel tank filled up. Most stations cannot pump fuel during load shedding.
- Keep some cash on hand because ATMs and card machines may be down as well.
- If a possibility, invest in a generator to run essential appliances and your home security system. Store spare fuel in a safe and responsible way.
- Install battery backup for your home security system and garage doors. Test and check, alarms and panic buttons to make sure that these and backup batteries are working optimally.
- Buy locks and chains to secure gates and doors that don't require electricity to operate.
- Torches, lamps and candles are essential for night-time load shedding. Make sure you have spare batteries and lighters on hand.
- Where possible invest in solar powered lights. Ensure that rechargeable emergency lights are always fully charged.
- Keep bottled water: With the recommended amount of drinking water is 2l per person per day.
- Stock up on dried fruit and canned food.
- Use a gas stove or a wood fire. Remember to cook in a well-ventilated area.
- Keep a well-stocked first aid kit in the house for any accidents that might occur.
- Restock chronic medication and ensure a few extra days of required medication is available.
- Make sure your IDs and passports and other important documents are up to date and easily accessible as Home Affairs systems might be down, at a time you may need them.
